About the Subject: Functional English is designed to equip learners with the practical language skills they need to navigate real-life situations with confidence and clarity. Aligned with the subject vision of enabling effective communication for personal, social, and professional empowerment, the course focuses on building core competencies in speaking, listening, reading, and writing.

About the Assessment Design: Assessments are thoughtfully designed to reinforce this vision by focusing on real-world language use—through practical speaking and listening tasks, functional reading and writing exercises, and consistent engagement via portfolios and project-based work

STRUCTURE OF THEORY EXAM

Time: 3 Hrs. Max. Marks:

General Guidelines

- 1. The question paper will cover the whole syllabus. No topic should be over-represented, and repetition of questions or concepts should be avoided. The syllabus is provided in **Annexure 1**.
- 2. There are 3 sections in the question paper i.e. Section A, Section B and Section C.
- 3. Section A assesses reading comprehension skills, Sections B assesses use of language and Section C assesses writing skills.
- 4. Word limits and marks for each question and sub-question must be clearly indicated on the paper as detailed below.

SECTION A (READING COMPREHENSION) - 17 marks

This section will have two passages: one seen passage for 7 marks and one unseen passage for 10 marks. This section is designed to test comprehension, interpretation and inference in seen and unseen formats. The details of both are given below.

1. Seen passage:

- a. After reading the seen passage, the student will answer 3 Objective Type Questions (2 Multiple Choice type questions, 1 fill in the blank) each for 1 mark and 2 short answer questions for 2 marks each.
- b. The length of this passage will be between 100 150 words.

2. Unseen passage:

- a. After reading the unseen passage, the student will answer 6 Objective Type Questions (4 Multiple Choice type questions, 2 Fill in the blank) each for 1 mark and 2 short answer (two-line answers) questions for 2 marks each.
- b. The length of this passage will be between 200 250 words.

SECTION B (USE OF LANGUAGE) - 16 marks

This section will assess grammar and vocabulary.

- 1. **Grammar** will be assessed for **10 marks with 10 objective type questions,** each for 1 mark.
- 2. **Vocabulary** will be assessed for **6 marks with** 6 objective type questions each for 1 mark.

SECTION C (WRITING) - 17 marks

This section assesses the learner's ability to express ideas clearly and appropriately in written form across different formats. There will be **3 questions each with internal choice**. The details of these three questions and marks distribution are given below:

 Long Writing Task: The first question will be a long answer question involving letter writing (formal letter, informal letter, email or application) assessed for 7 marks.

2. Short Writing Task:

- a. The second question will be short form writing entailing paragraph writing (with hints) assessed for **5 marks**.
- b. The third question will be short form writing and will involve functional writing (Letter of Invitation, Letter of Response to Invitation, or Email Message) assessed for **5 marks**.

The rubric for the writing task is attached in **Annexure 2**.

STRUCTURE OF PRACTICAL EXAM

General Guidelines

- 1. The practical exam should assess core skills and knowledge aligned with the course's learning outcomes. It must evaluate both linguistic and conceptual understanding.
- 2. The practical exam will consist of two sections: Section A (Listening) and Section B (Speaking).
- 3. Section A will contribute towards 10 marks while Section B will contribute 20 marks.
- 4. Examiners should provide clear instructions and share a list of required materials (e.g., prompts, cue cards, rubrics) in advance.
- 5. Examiners should follow the task-specific marking guidelines provided below.
- 6. Examiners will comprise a panel having two teachers, one internal examiner and an external examiner teaching the same subject.

SECTION A (LISTENING)- 10 marks

This section will consist of two audios that will be played. Questions will follow the sequence of the listening audio. Pre-listening time for the question paper is essential. Students should be given time to transfer their answers to the answer sheet. Marks should be awarded based on the provided answer key. The subcomponents of the listening section are as follows:

1. Listening Audio 1

- i. Each audio will be followed by 10 objective type questions (0.5 mark each).
- ii. All questions will be compulsory to attempt.

2. Listening Audio 2

- i. Each audio will be followed by 10 objective type questions (0.5 mark each).
- ii. All questions will be compulsory to attempt.

SECTION B (SPEAKING)- 20 marks

This component of the assessment will evaluate students' oral communication skills, based on selected topics from the prescribed textbook for the speaking practical. The assessment will consist of 2 sections: spoken production and spoken interaction.

- **1. Project Report** (not applicable in Semester 1 & 4 marks in Sem 2)
 - i. One project report per group is expected to be submitted on A4 sheets.
 - ii. The report needs to be 8-10 pages long.
- **2. Spoken Production** (10 marks in Sem 1 & 8 marks in Sem 2)
 - i. Each student will prepare a short (1-1.5 minute) speech on the project.
 - ii. Presentation will occur in a group but will be assessed individually.
- **3. Spoken Interaction** (10 marks in Sem 1 & 8 marks in Sem 2)
 - i. For spoken interaction, the external examiner will ask the students questions based on the project and their speech.
 - ii. Assessment will be done on parameters, such as Grammar and Usage, Lexical Resource/Vocabulary, Fluency and Clarity of Speech.
 - iii. The examiner should ensure that each student gets a chance to answer at least 2 questions.

Rubrics for each of the components mentioned above have been provided in Annexure

3. Marks should be awarded based on specified criteria. Partial marking should be implemented to give credit for correct format, tone, language use, or structure even if the task is incomplete.

SECTION B (Speaking and Writing)- 10 marks

This component will be conducted mid-term as part of the continuous evaluation process. A total of 10 marks will be allocated, with 5 marks each for Speaking and Writing.
